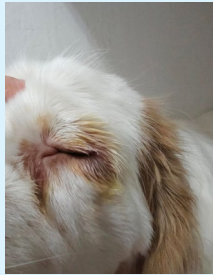

Otto gave blood for the first time earlier this year to save the life of one of our gorgeous patients - little Poppy.

Jo Kent from BBC South picked up on the story and to help raise awareness of the importance of dogs giving blood, she filmed Poppy and her human family, as well as Otto, Nariiece and veterinary surgeon Katie Wood.

Huge thanks to all who took part because we could not do the work we do and help our patients survive some surgeries and severe anaemias, without blood transfusions.

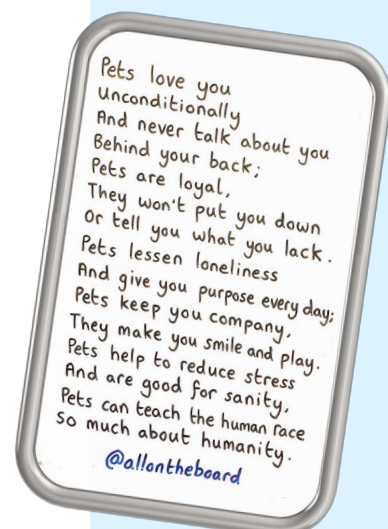


### RU

Following treatment at Seadown Ru went onto make a full recovery, but this year, Ru disappeared into the bushes and when he came back, his head was down and he was shaking.

Back at Seadown, Ru was examined by veterinary surgeon Katie Wood who administered intravenous pain relief, antihistamine and antibiotics. Fortunately, in Ru's case antivenom was not required and once again Ru made a complete recovery, just in time for BBC News and their reporter Jo Kent, to film the story and make Ru a local hero.

## Seasonal Pet Do's and Don'ts

### Do .....

- exercise pets regularly in the winter. It may be cold, but it's part of their routine care.
- Put your dog on a lead near frozen ponds.
- Rinse salt or grit from paws. Both can irritate skin.
- Help our feathered friends in winter and top up the wild bird feeding table.
- Check that small furries living outside have plenty of warm, dry bedding, unfrozen water and ensure that hutches are draught and rain/snow proof.
- Supervise pets near log burners and open fires.
- Clear away antifreeze spills. It tastes sweet to our pets, but can be fatal if ingested!
- Store chocolate, foods containing it, grapes and raisins well out of reach, as these are very poisonous to your pets.



### Don't. ....

- give your pet too many treats. It can cause tummy upsets and unhealthy weight gain.
- Feed turkey bones. These are sharp and can cause internal damage or get lodged in the throat.
- Have real mistletoe/holly and their berries in your home. If ingested by your pet, both can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and drooling, plus blood pressure and breathing problems. Also a poinsettia's white sap is an irritant to the skin, mouth and throat causing itching and swelling.
- Leave batteries or electronic cigarettes lying around to be chewed and swallowed. Both are extremely dangerous items for your pet.

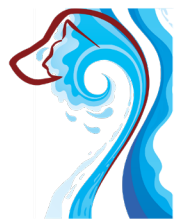
